### Join The Navy And See The World . . .



At the age of sixteen I decided that I wanted to join the Royal Navy. On being accepted in October 1957 I was instructed to report to HMS *VICTORY BARRACKS* at Portsmouth.

On arrival I met up with other recruits where we spent the next two weeks being kitted out with our uniforms etc. then we were sent to HMS *RALEIGH* for our basic training in seamanship and the usual square bashing and kit inspections. On passing out from HMS *RALEIGH* I was sent on a Gunnery Course at HMS *CAMBRIDGE*.

On completion I was drafted to my first seagoing ship the fast minelayer HMS *APOLLO* the Flag ship of C in C Home Fleets so we managed some excellent visits to foreign ports. UK ports included the Pool of London where we also acted

as guard ship to the Royal Yacht *BRITANNIA* during Cowes Regatta week whilst the Duke of Edinburgh was onboard.

At sea on a warship, most of the time it is naval exercises with other warships, or goodwill visits and self maintenance in home ports. HMS *APOLLO* was an old

Continued from page one there were no home comforts. Onboard washing of clothes was done by hand in a bucket and finding a space to sling your hammock for sleeping was not easy. I managed to find a space on the mining deck passageway. All meals had to be collected from the galley and taken to the mess deck for eating and there was only one choice of meal; milk for tea was condensed milk.

In July 1958 we got a change from our normal routine when we were despatched to protect our fishing trawlers in the dispute between Britain and Iceland over fishing known as the Cod War. We had a few close encounters with the Icelandic Gun Boats **THOR** and **ODIN!!!** Icelandic weather could be a bit rough but we were well supplied with fish from the trawlers to compensate.

In January 1960 after eighteen months onboard I left HMS **APOLLO** and went back to RN Barracks at Portsmouth.

In March 1960 I joined HMS **CAMPERDOWN** a Battle Class Destroyer under refit in Devonport Dockyard. On 26<sup>th</sup> April the ship was commissioned into service and after a period of sea trials we joined other ships from various NATO countries on exercises in UK waters and also visited various ports around the UK. On one of these exercises we were acting as plane-guard



to HMS **ARK ROYAL** when one of her planes crashed on landing and went over the side with the loss of pilot and observer. On this exercise we crossed the Arctic Circle earning our Bluenose Certificate at the end of the exercise; we steamed through a force eight gale in the North Sea back to Devonport for some home leave and preparation for our deployment to the Mediterranean.

On 21<sup>st</sup> October 1960 we sailed in company with our sister ships HMS **SAINTEs** and HMS **SOLEBAY** to Gibraltar for the start of our Mediterranean deployment. Meeting up with the Aircraft Carrier HMS **VICTORIOUS** the next day we sailed through some very unpleasant weather in the Bay of Biscay. On arrival at Gibraltar we spent the next ten days on self maintenance and loading stores etc.

On 4<sup>th</sup> November 1960 we set sail for Malta calling at Toulon and Malaga on the way arriving at Malta on 26<sup>th</sup> November where Christmas and New Year was spent. Our time in the Mediterranean was spent on exercises self maintenance and visits to foreign ports. In June 1961 we joined a NATO fleet in Naples Bay for Fleet Review by the C-in-C Mediterranean. I was one of the unlucky ones detailed for guard, parading ashore where we endured a long march in sweltering heat with a .303 rifle on the shoulder which became quite heavy after a while. We also got sent to Kuwait in the Persian Gulf when General Kassan threatened the independence of Kuwait over oil where we spent the next few weeks before returning to Malta. After ten months away we returned to Devonport on 14<sup>th</sup> September and home leave was granted.

Continued from page four After returning from leave the next few months was spent in home waters until we de-commissioned on 9<sup>th</sup> April 1962. During the commission we steamed 65,000 miles visiting numerous foreign countries including France, Spain, Italy, Malta, Canary Isles, Corfu, Aden, Kuwait, Gibraltar, and transit through Suez Canal.

On leaving HMS **CAMPERDOWN** I spent the next eighteen months at HMS **COCHRANE** at Rosyth in Scotland living onboard the accommodation ship **DUNCANSBY HEAD**.



In October 1964 I joined the Aircraft Carrier HMS **ARK ROYAL** which was under refit in Devonport Dockyard and on 12<sup>th</sup> November we officially re-commissioned. On 24<sup>th</sup> November we sailed for sea trials and two days later we were called upon to conduct a search for a Sea Vixen aircraft that had come out to inspect our new flight deck lighting but had failed to return to Yeovilton. Sadly the search was unsuccessful. After deck landing trials were completed we embarked our squadrons of Sea Vixen and Scimitar aircraft onboard where flying exercises were carried out in the North Sea. On completion of flying trials we sailed to Brest for a visit but came

across the fishing vessel **ALDERSEA** which had been in distress for two days in a storm lashed North Sea with engine failure and her radio out of action. A message was passed to Grimsby and we stood by the **ALDERSEA** for five hours until a tug arrived then we continued to Brest where we spent the next four days.

For the next two months it was self maintenance and exercises. A visit to Bergen for five days then it was back to flying trials with the new Buccaneer II aircraft from Boscombe Down; on completion of exercises and flying trials we returned to Devonport on 2<sup>nd</sup> April for Easter leave.

On 17<sup>th</sup> June 1965 we departed Devonport on our way to Far East Station calling at Gibraltar for two days. On 29<sup>th</sup> June we transitted the Suez Canal arriving at Aden on July 2<sup>nd</sup>. On the 8<sup>th</sup> July we relieved the Aircraft Carrier HMS **VICTORIOUS** arriving in Singapore on 19<sup>th</sup> July for a period of self maintenance. After that three months it was back to normal exercises self maintenance and visits to Subic Bay in the Philippines and Hong Kong which was delayed for a day because of tropical storm Agnes. October saw us back in Singapore and Captain Fell relieved Captain Griffin who was to be promoted to Rear Admiral. During our stay in Singapore a fire broke out in B boiler room and because of this we missed a visit to Japan and Sydney, Australia. However we managed to get to Freemantle for Christmas where the festivities were enjoyed by all. On the way there we crossed the equator where the usual crossing-the-line ceremony was held onboard.

On 27<sup>th</sup> December we left Freemantle for Singapore where flying exercises were conducted off the Cocos Islands. On New Year's Eve one of the seamen was found to be missing and after an unsuccessful search of the ship it was presumed that he

was lost overboard so we finally arrived back in Singapore on 8<sup>th</sup> January 1966 for self maintenance for three weeks. This was followed by more exercises and a visit to Mombasa after which we were despatched to the Mozambique Channel where we relieved HMS **EAGLE** on surveillance for oil tankers taking oil to Rhodesia. We were eventually relieved by HMS **EAGLE** so returned to Singapore.

On 26<sup>th</sup> April we departed Singapore for Devonport. On the way we again relieved HMS **EAGLE** in the Mozambique Channel where we spent another three weeks finally arriving back at Devonport on June 13<sup>th</sup> 1966 where leave was **granted to the ship's company**.

During our two year commission we lost some aircraft and five aircrew including pilots and observers.

My last year of service was at HMS **COCHRANE** at Rosyth in Scotland and in December 1967 I returned to RN Barracks Portsmouth and finally back into Civvy Street in January 1968.

**Bronze Certificate for The Newark Show**



### Swedish Pudding

(serves 2)



Grate apple into dish which will hold at least 1/2 pint of custard and add 1-2 tablespoons of sultanas or raisins. Pour on 1/2 pint of custard and gently spoon fruit through.

The sultanas provide sweetness so sugar can be omitted from custard especially if eating apples are used - suitable for diabetics.
