


MEMBERSHIP BADGES were presented at the April Branch meeting to Mrs Claire Watling, Mrs Frances Cot-

magazine for May 1953 had come into the possession of our Welfare Officer Mr. John Liddell. His son had discovered it in an oven whilst renovating an old cottage. Herewith are a few excerpts from it.

FRONT PAGE

The lead article was under the heading "Legion Seeks New Meeting With Pensions Minister". This concerned the RBL National Executive Council deploring the fact that war pensioners interests had been totally ignored in the Budget Statement and a full page inside is devoted to the debate on this matter in Parliament. In conclusion, Mr Heathcote Amory (Pensions Minister) agreed that there was "room for difference of opinion" about the pension rates generally! (A typical MP's non-answer to a question--some things never alter -- Ed.)

Incidentally the cost of the magazine was 4d (old money) but was purchased by the branches for 3/6d a dozen, so each copy sold afforded a profit of 1/2d for the branch.

LOCAL INTEREST

News of local interest concerned the Birstall Branch. A headline from the Daily Mirror was reproduced stating that Birstall (Leics) Angling Club had won £150 prize money in that newspaper's angling competition. This angling club was in fact a sub-section of the Birstall British Legion, and the article went on to say how a small

lake in the village was rented for £100 by the 46 angling club members and that they had a special arrangement by which pensioners and other exservicemen who were unable to afford the necessarily high subscriptions could still enjoy the club's hospitality.

Closer to home was a paragraph which reads, "Great Glen Branch (Leics) has just celebrated its coming of age. At the 21st birthday meeting the branch marked the occasion by presenting Mr T Martin with a life membership certificate for his services. Since the formation of the branch he has been Chairman and Secretary."

CORONATION

This edition of the magazine being May 1953, it was of course issued just ahead of the Coronation of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II on 2nd June.

An article in the paper informs us that as Her Majesty returns to Buckingham Palace after the Coronation Service, she will be greeted by 1,700 ex-servicemen, including 1,100 Legionaries, at Hyde Park, around the Wellington statue, where 89 standards, more than half of them Legion standards, will dip in salutation.

13 representatives of the British Legion will be present in the Abbey, and 1,010 (*I wonder who the odd 10 were?--Ed*) will be seated in the Hyde Park stands, and 440 war widows whose tickets have been allocated by the Legion's Women's Section, will also have seats in the Park.

The writer gives the film and Burton a good review, and ends with the words: " Given films of this standard, it will be long before the sands of the Western Desert grow cold, with the cinematic reminiscence of feet, wheels and tracks passing over them."!!
