Manchester City FC Celebrates a Team Victory for the Poppy Appeal



They may have only secured one point from their last game with Liverpool, but Manchester City players still had a reason to celebrate after announcing they have raised a whopping £15,000 for the Poppy Appeal.

Ahead of the premier league game last Sunday, former players Paul Lake and Alex Williams presented the fundraising amount to Colour Sergeant Paul Watson and three fellow guardsmen from the Irish Guards.

Last November the club pledged their support for the Legion by wearing shirts embroidered with the poppy emblem for their clash against Tottenham Hotspur on Sunday 11th. The shirts were then auctioned off to fans, raising £13,000, and an additional £2,000 was raised from bucket collections at the match and staff contributions.

Holmes, MoneyForce also features video case studies, based on true life stories from the Armed Forces community.



Retired Seafarers & WRNS pick up the phone and say a huge thankyou to Seafarers UK

Life and work at sea is largely unreported, apart from Maritime disasters, and not understood by the majority of the population. Demanding and dangerous as this occupation can be, it also involves repeated periods away from home and loved ones. For many seafarers, career change or retirement deprives them of the onboard companionship that has sustained them throughout their days afloat. Ageing, changes in domestic circumstances and financial problems often lead to feelings of loneliness and isolation. The Maritime Charities Funding Group's research identified this serious problem amongst the growing numbers of retired seafarers. Former seafarers say it's the close onboard friendships that they miss most when their seafaring days are over. But the major on-going difficulty has been in locating them, and establishing that first point of contact. At the last MCFG Conference there was much discussion about these retired seafarers acknowledging that isolation and loneliness is a huge issue that they face on a daily basis and with this in mind we continue to look for more seafarers to benefit from Seafarers Link. The news that Seafarers UK has given Community Network a grant to ensure that we can continue to support these seafarers for the next 2 years has been very welcome.

On hearing the news that his phone calls can continue 89 year old, ex radio officer Frank Kelly who has been involved in these phone calls for the past four years says "once anyone has spent time at sea one becomes quite unfit for any other kind of company except seamen. Seafarers Link provides the unique opportunity to chat and swing the lamp with people who talk the same language"

Community Network is the UK's only charity using teleconferencing technology to deliver social care and support to residents across the country. Having worked with the local seafaring charities, Community Network set up **Seafarers Link** to establish befriending groups across the UK to alleviate this isolation. This link also enables these seafarers to chat about and share stories from their seafaring experiences. The first group was launched in Hull in June 2009, and today the project remains active, with eight participating groups linking seafarers from the Shetland Islands down to Cornwall. Within these groups there are two virtual **R**oyal **N**avy **A**ssociation groups whose main purpose is to keep members no longer able to attend branch meetings due to ill health, in touch. All of the group link-ups have given retired seafarers the opportunity to exchange stories and experiences, to develop new friendships, and occasionally to provide simple solutions to shared problems. Community Network has produced a CD of some of the wonderful stories that have come to light during the phone calls, and this has ensured that at least some of those old tales from during and after World War II remain written down for the future.

Group facilitators are recruited and trained by Community Network to conduct and manage the phone calls. Their voluntary involvement with the project is invaluable and their confidence and skills contribute to the success of these informal discussions. Many of these facilitators are former seafarers, or sea-wives, but a marine background is not important, and we are always seeking more volunteers to run new groups.

Age, location, change of profession, disability and ill health are contributing factors to their feeling of social isolation. Whatever the circumstances, the fortnightly group conversations and exchanges help people to build and maintain relationships and camaraderie within their group. This provides a sense of social connection and well-being for those suffering isolation and depression.

The benefits of the services that Community Network give has been highlighted in a recent Department of Health funded study by the Institute for Volunteering Research, "Volunteering and health: good practice case studies". Paul Burstow, Minister for Care Services, launched the Department for Health's revised vision for volunteering. The vision presented a number of examples of "good volunteering" practice, demonstrating the benefits to the health and well being of both volunteers and service users. **Seafarer's Link** was cited as one example of good practice.

Seafarers Link is unique in its concept and is one of the most successful projects run by Community Network, awarded "*The Most Innovative Use of Technology in Delivering a Helpline Service*" by The Helpline Association's (THA) February 2010.

Key dates forming the basis of Government-led commemorations:

- 1. **4 August 2014**: National services to mark 100th Anniversary of Britain declaring war on Germany
- 2. **25 April 2015**: Events to mark commencement of Battle of Gallipoli
- 3. **1 July 2016**: Events to mark the first day of the Battle of the Somme
- 4. **31 May 01 June 2016**: Events to mark the naval Battle of Jutland
- 5. **June November 2017**: Events to mark the Battle of Passchendaele (The Third Battle of Ypres)
- 6. **OB August 11 November 2018**: The last 100 days from the commencement of the Battle of Amiens to the Armistice on 11 November will be a period of national commemoration.

Also, while not a part of the official Government agenda, we are likely to see significant activity surrounding:

7. **24-25 December 2014**: Christmas truce football matches in Flanders

"Mr Powers then asked me the last name of my uncle Neville and when I said Sidlow he took a step back and did not speak for a few moments. We could not believe the coincidence."

Dear Colleagues:

Many of you are being asked about The Royal British Legion's activities linked to the WWI Centenary Commemorations from 2014 – 2018.

I therefore felt it appropriate to set out in broad terms what we will be doing at national level and to give you background information on our overall strategy.

Within the organisation, I will hold overall responsibility for the WWI Centenary activities, supported by Robert Lee, Assistant Director of Marketing.

The Government is taking the lead on national activities and the Prime Minister has announced a £50million commitment to support the Centenary, including special focus on local activities and delivering a cultural and educational legacy for young people.

The Legion is determined that the tone will be one of commemoration, not celebration; and that Centenary activities will be available to all and kept free of partisan or sectarian bias.

The Legion is therefore working closely with the Prime Minister's Special Representative on the Centenary, Dr Andrew Murrison; various other Ministers and Government Departments; and stakeholders such as The Imperial War Museum, The Commonwealth War Graves Commission, and the National Archives. We are linking closely to activities being co-ordinated in Scotland, Wales and Ireland.

In terms of national initiatives, I have created a Legion WWI Centenary Working Group including the parent charity, the National Memorial Arboretum and Poppyscotland.

This group will meet regularly to evaluate external project and partnership proposals and its priority will be to select projects that support our own beneficiaries, Members, and our charitable pillars, in particular Comradeship and Remembrance.

We have a range of national projects already committed, and the Board of Trustees will shortly be considering the development of the new Visitor's Centre at the National Memorial Arboretum (our own centre of Remembrance), exciting plans for Remembrance Travel and special WWI resources for schools produced as part of the Legion's learning programme.

I will be looking to the regions and local branches to support our na-
