## Operation Dynamo

The dates of 27 May to 4 June 1940 will be etched in the annals of British history as the period that an armada of little ships saved an army. The image is conjured up of hundreds of small boats ferrying soldiers from the beaches of Dunkirk back to England. The facts were slightly different, but not that it detracts from the role of the small boats armada. Official figures show only some 6000 men being returned to England by small boats but in reality some 100,000 soldiers were fer-



ried off the beaches by these small boats to the larger ships lying off shore. It is not known how many small boats took part but more than 200 are known to have been sunk as well as 6 Royal Navy and 3 French Navy destroyers, two personnel ships and several large merchant navy vessels.

The western route across the Channel was the shortest, at 39 sea miles, but was vulnerable to attack from gun batteries at Calais and from 28 May the longer eastern

route, at 87 sea miles had to be used. A final route of 55 sea miles was created by clearing a gap in the minefield.

The last vessel to leave Dunkirk was the old destroyer Shikari, leaving at 3.40am on 4 June, carrying 383 troops. Operation Dynamo ended at 2.23pm.

The BEF lost 68,111 killed, wounded and prisoner, 2472 guns, 63,879 vehicles, 20548 motorcycles and 500,000 tons of stores and ammunition during the evacuation, The number of prisoners captured is not certain – German sources suggest that 80,000 men were captured around Dunkirk.

The RAF were much criticised for 'abandoning' the men on the beaches to the Luftwaffe attacks. Between 26 May and 4 June the RAF flew 4,822 sorties over

Dunkirk, losing over 100 aircraft in the fighting. Much of the air fighting took place away from the beaches as the RAF tried to break up German raids before they dropped their bombs and patrolled the sea lanes used for the evacuation.

The initial expectations were that some 45,000 men would be rescued over two days, in reality over 338,000 men were evacuated in this massive operation which led Winston Churchill saying to Parliament on 4 June "We must be very careful not to assign to this deliverance



the attributes of a victory. Wars are not won by evacuation.... We shall go on to the end. We shall fight in France, we shall fight in the seas and oceans, we shall fight with growing confidence and growing strength in the air; we shall defend our Island, whatever the cost may be, we shall fight on the beaches, we shall fight on the landing grounds, we shall fight in the fields and in the streets, we shall fight in the hills; we shall never surrender". There is no doubt that the 'victory' at Dunkirk secured Britain's continued involvement in WW2.

# **Armed Forces Day**

The event is an annual opportunity to show your support for the men and women who make up our armed forces community; from currently serving troops to service families and from veterans to cadets.

This year it will be held in Welland Park on Sunday July 4th starting at 10 am.

Following the opening parade the Deputy Lord Lieutenant Andrew Grainger will formally open the event. It is hoped that there will be display stands from the police, St John's, Poppy Calls, RAFA, RNA, Army Cadet Force and the fire brigade. plus others.

The band of 1084 ATC Squadron will display during the day and the event will be supported by HFM.

Harborough Band is also to play during the day.

This is not a fund raising event but donations will be received for Help the Heroes and Support our Soldiers. So pop along with your friends and show your support for the armed forces community.

#### Cadet 150 Parade

2010 celebrates the 150th anniversary of the formation of the Cadet Corps which was formed to help bolster the country's defence numbers following heavy losses in the Crimean War.

131,000 cadets have taken part in events across the country and overseas supported by the 25,000 adult volunteers without whose support the cadet forces couldn't operate. As part of the anniversary celebratoday's 4 cadet forces, Sea Cadets, Army Cadet Force, Air Training Corps and Combined Cadet Force each led by their own band will proudly march down the Mall and then to a Royal Garden Party in Buckingham Palace. The event takes place on July 6th and the parade starts at noon.

There is much controversy as to authorship and if it was given to Violette. She never used the code as she was captured before contacting Britain. In his 1998 autobiography Marks said he wrote it on Christmas Eve 1943 in memory of his girlfriend Ruth who died in a plane crash. Whatever the truth an iconic poem giving comfort to many at times of grief.

#### Tigers at Dunkirk Book Review

This 160 page hardback book is a vivid reconstruction of the British army's defeat in the disastrous 1940 France and Flanders campaign. The book centres on the experiences of the soldiers of the 2/5 Leicesters the 'Tigers'. Formed in 1938 the battalion joined the BEF in April 1940 where they were to undertake further training and labouring duties. Despite its lack of training the battalion was sent into the line on 25 May to stem the German advance. Outgunned, dive-bombed and then attacked by infantry, most were killed or captured. only B Company and a few stragglers escaped and headed for Dunkirk. These soldiers typified the British battalions that faced the blitzkrieg and the might of Hitler's soldiers and tanks. If it hadn't been for the bravery of the rearguard actions fought by the soldiers and some decisions by the German army the evacuation from Dunkirk might have had a different result affecting the whole course of the war.
