

## The First Men In Space

Yuri Gagarin became the first man to go into space in 1961. Born in 1934 he trained as a metalworker at the industrial technical school in Saratov. While he was in Saratov, he joined a flying club and his instructor recommended him to the air force, and Gagarin started at the Soviet Air Force cadet training school in 1955. He graduated with high distinction in 1957.

Gagarin applied for the six-week cosmonaut screening process in 1960. Over 2,000 Russian military pilots were considered. Only 20 were selected for intensive training. As training began, two men quickly emerged as front runners - Yuri Gagarin and Gherman Titov. The odds seemed to be in Titov's favour. But it was their social background that played the decisive role. Titov was the son of a teacher, but Gagarin, the son of a worker, was living proof that under communism, even the son of a peasant family could succeed.

On April 12 1961 Gagarin entered the capsule and at 9:07 am, Vostok 1 lifted off for its 108-minute flight. Wearing his protective suit, the pilot was strapped into an ejection seat equipped with the necessary communications gear and parachute. In an interview, Gagarin described the event: "At seven past nine Moscow time I felt the powerful rocket boosters. Everything was vibrating, and then, very slowly, I took off." Confident as ever, Gagarin shouted "Let's go!" as he began the journey.

"I felt the pressure of the g-forces on my body," Gagarin said later.
"They pushed me right down into my seat. It was difficult to move my arms. I knew it wouldn't be long until the rocket left the earth's gravitational pull and I was in orbit." When it was obvious that Gagarin had made it into orbit, the Kremlin ordered the Russian news agency, Tass to make a prepared broadcast. The official announcement said simply: "The first cosmonaut in the



world is in space." The odds for Gagarin surviving the launch had been

calculated at just 50-50, but the odds on his returning were not so favourable. As his ship re-entered the earth's atmosphere, his capsule failed to separate properly from its carrier rocket and was spinning out of control. Disorientated, Gagarin failed to follow instructions from ground control and ejected too early. A tractor driver was working in the fields saw a figure parachuting from the sky. A few miles away, two schoolgirls rushed outside when Gagarin's capsule fell to Earth. "It was a huge ball, about two or three metres high. It fell, then it bounced and then it fell again. There was a huge hole where it hit first time, " said one. The details of Gagarin's

parachute landing had to be concealed. The flight could qualify as a world record only if the pilot stayed inside the capsule all the way to touchdown.



Gagarin became a national hero and his name known world wide. Gagarin was on the backup crew for Soyuz 1 and reportedly was a leading candidate for the planned Soviet piloted lunar landing. He was killed on a routine jet proficiency flight in March 1968. Gagarin's ashes were interred in the Kremlin wall.

rst US astronaut Alan Shepard was born in 1923 and in 1941 he entered the United States Naval Academy. He graduated on June 7 1944 and subsequently entered flight training receiving his wings in 1947, he then graduated from Naval Test Pilot School in 1951. In 1959 the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) sent invites to 110 test pilots, asking them to volunteer. Shepard was disappointed because he did not receive an invitation. It turned out that his name had been among the 110, but his invitation had been misplaced. Shepard was among the seven chosen for Project Mercury. On May 5, 1961, only 23 days after

Gagarin became the first man in space, Shepard was launched at 9:34am aboard the spacecraft he named *Freedom 7*. He was



launched suborbitally to an altitude of over 116 miles, 303 statute miles down range from Cape Canaveral. His 15 minute 28 second flight achieved a

speed of 5,134 mph. During the flight, Cdr Shepard reported on cloud cover over Florida and North Carolina and commented, "Oh, what a beautiful view." As he re-entered the Earth's atmosphere, he was subjected to 11 times the force of gravity but reported that he was "OK".

Freedom 7 splashed down in the Atlantic Ocean where the aircraft carrier Lake Champlain awaited his arrival.

that the engineers who went over it with a fine-tooth comb decided that it could be used again. The doctors also assessed that the commander was in excellent shape, physically and psychologically and "...could be used again too."

Shepard's flight was still a history-making event. Whereas Gagarin had only been a passenger in his vehicle, Shepard was able to manoeuvre the spacecraft himself. While the Soviet mission was veiled in secrecy, Shepard's flight, return from space, splashdown at sea and recovery by helicopter to a waiting aircraft carrier were seen on live television by millions around the world.

In 1964 he was diagnosed with Meniere's syndrome which results in disorientation, dizziness and nausea. He was also diagnosed with glaucoma. He was grounded and the Navy forbade him from flying jet planes solo.

In early 1969, Shepard decided to have an operation on his ear. He went to a Los Angeles physician, checked into the hotel under a pseudonym to avoid publicity, and had a small tube planted in his inner ear. The operation was a success and Shepard was restored to full flight status on May 7 1969. Shepard made his second space flight as spacecraft commander on Apollo 14, January 31 - February 9, 1971.

He retired from NASA and the Navy on August 1, 1974 and died on the night of July 21 1998, aged 74 after a long battle with leukaemia.
