20th March 1923



This was the heading of a report in the centre column of page 2 of the Midland Mail of Friday 23rd March 1923. It started

'On Tuesday evening a meeting was held in the Assembly Rooms at Market Harborough for the purpose of endeavouring to form a branch of the British Legion.' The meeting was the result of this announcement the previous week:


BRITISH LEGION A Meeting of ex-Service Men will be held in the Small Assembly Room Market Harbor-

ough on Tuesday. March 20th. 1923 when an address will be given by Mr Councillor. 5 A Barber (of Mansfield) Vice Chairman of the East Midlands Area Council and Member of the National Executive Council of the British Legion, Chair will be taken at 86m by the Rev H I Egcott, Hon. Chaplin to H M Forces. The object of the meeting is to form a Branch of the Legion in Market Harborough."

The Rev. H J T Eascott presided. He said he had been looking through some of the pamphlets issued by Legion and the facts therein simply left one aghast. He wished there had been a larger attendance but was glad to welcome those who were present because if they were bound together in the Legion they could do something to alleviate the misery and distress that was illustrated in those tragic lists.

Councillor Barber of Mansfield said the Legion had been formed by the amalgamation of four chief organisations the Officers Association, the Comrades of the Great War, the National Federation and the National Association. The Legion was democratic, non-party politically and non-sectarian. It was intended to look after ex-service

men in every place. The speaker referred to the efforts of the Legion for the young man who was deprived of his trade training by reason of his having gone to the war; the successful establishment of the ship-breaking yards as a means of alleviating distress and unemployment; the systems of

loans to enable men to start small businesses, which, whilst having had a percentage of failures, had been generally successful. The influence of the Legion in influencing the retention of the Ministry of Pensions was also alluded to and the Legion's work in connection with pensions also. They were, said the speaker, far from satisfied with the administration of war. pensions in this. country today, but nothing could ever be unless they made themselves into powerful body.

That was one reason why Market Harborough and other bodies outside should join up. The administration expenses of the Legion were very low. In conclusion, the speaker said they found amongst members of the Legion that spirit of comradeship amongst officers and men that existed in the war.

Councillor Petrie of Derby also advocated the claims of the Legion and gave instances of its influence in local public work - War Pensions Committees, local Councils and Boards of Guardians ,etc. - where the interests of ex-service men were involved. Many things could be done for ex-

service men by a powerful organisation which they could never hope to achieve as individuals.

The building on the left was the Corn
Exchange at the rear of which was the
Assembly Room. They were both
demolished and became the site of the
Golden Wonder Offices in Abbey Street,
now converted to shops and motel.

House, now a hairdresser solon and

in reply to Captain Jeffirey Clark Barber Mr the said whole of the funds of the organisations he named had been amalgamated in the British Legion.

Captain Clark said he had every sympathy with the British Legion and thought it was an excellent organisation. He proposed that they formally establish a branch of the Legion for Market Harborough.

Ex- Sergeant Major Pierce seconded

and the resolution was carried unanimously.

The first officers of the Branch were elected as follows:-

Chairman, the Rev H J T Eascott, C.F., Secretary, Mr Wright, Treasurer, Mr J Goldsbrough; Committee, Major R Tombnson, Captain Knighton, Captain Steadman, Messrs Edgehill, G Freeman, Warner and Heggs.

Mr Barber said the minimum subscription to the Legion was 2s.6d; eighteen pence of this was remitted to Headquarters and of that eighteen pence, sixpence was remitted back to regional headquarters.


Commenting on Mr Wright's acceptance of the office of Secretary, Captain Knighton said Mr Wright had taken a great interest and done a great lot of work on behalf of ex-service men and they were very pleased to see him take this position.

Mr Wright said he had been disappointed with the Comrades Association, the interest in which fell away altogether. He hoped it would not do so with this Legion, and he appealed to everybody that if they were going to take it up they should do so wholeheartedly and make it a success.


The meeting ended with votes of thanks to the speakers and the Chairman


And a week later a report in the Market Harborough & District news column read:

BRITISH LEGION - A meeting in connection. the with Market: Harborough Branch of the British Legion was held in the Assembly Rooms on Monday evening, the Rev HIT Eacott C. F. presiding. A number of new members were enrolled and several more expressed their intention of transferring from other Branches. The branch already has several cases in hand in which it is endeavouring to extend help in various ways to local ex-service men. Mr Wright, Coventry Road, is the Secretary and will be very pleased to give any particulars.

Over the following early years the Branch had its meetings in a variety of locations including the Adult School, the Ambulance Hall, the Old Grammar School, 67 High Street, the Coventry Road Infants School and Anholme House (Abbey Street).

Pathway for Growth

This programme of change for the Legion was launched in 2010 and designed to ensure that all four pillars of the Legion mission (welfare, comradeship, representation and remembrance) are delivered more effectively including reaching more of our beneficiaries in more areas and help them to address their needs more effectively.

The Legion will have a visible high street presence in 16 major towns and cities, enabling beneficiaries to get advice and support. The public will be able to drop in to new walk-in centres and find out more about what the Legion does. Staff and members, and other charities supporting the armed forces community, will be able to use office and meeting space.

There will be other locations, shared with other charities, to provide dropin sessions for advice and information. A new national call centre and a new online facility will also be set up.

Members and other volunteers will still be needed to run the Poppy Appeal and to deal with local welfare case work and home and hospital visits.


It Happened in 1923

Those who had a Wireless Set like this and tuned in to station 2LO from this Savoy Hill studio of the




British Broadcasting Company, which had been formed on 18 October, could keep up to date with the news and other programmes. A receiving Licence

was required, costing ten shillings, (about £23 in today's money). The Radio Times first appeared three weeks before the BBC actually existed.



The Cinema, such as the Electric on the Square in Market Harborough, was another source of News and entertainment, although still without sound. News reels by Pathe showed events of the day such as a huge fire in



Hartlepool, the Royal Wedding, the General Election and the FA Cup Final at the new Wembley Stadium where the enormous crowd which had overflowed on to the pitch was eventually cleared by Billy, the mounted Police White Horse. Play started 45 minutes lateand ended in a 2-0 victory for Bolton Wanderers over West Ham.

What most people relied on for news was the daily Newspaper of which there were twenty-five national titles including the Chronicle.



Graphic, Herald, News, Morning Post and Evening Standard. As now they relied on advertising products such as these or entertainment like the



Midnight Follies Orchestra and other popular dance bands performing at the big London hotels, the Hammersmith Palais, Café de Paris and the newly opened Lyons Corner House in the Strand.



Some Notable Months

The 'Big Four' Railway companies were formed as a result of the Railways Act 1921

London and North Eastern Railway (LNER) The Flying Scotsman, its most famous locomotive entered service. It was retired from regular service in 1963 after covering 2,076,000 miles



Great Western Railway (GWR)
The only one of the earlier companies
to retain its name. It was called by
some "God's Wonderful Railway" and
by others the "Great Way Round"

London Midland and Scottish Railway (LMS) was the world's largest transport organisation, the largest commercial business in the British Empire and the United Kingdom's second largest employer, after the Post Office.

Southern Railway (SR) It served Southern England and operated a number of famous named trains, including the Brighton Belle, the Bournemouth Belle, and the Golden Arrow.

Mrs Johnson gave birth to a son, Tony, on

Wednesday, 7th.



The tomb of Tutenkhamun, the 11st pharaoh of the 18st Dynasty of Ancient Egypt was opened on the 16th following its discovery in 1922 by the archaeolist Howard Carter.

Patrick Moore was born on the 4th. He became Sir Patrick Moore CBE, FRS, FRAS, best known for his BBC series The Sky at Night. He died on 9 December, 2012. Prince Albert, Duke of York (later King George VI), and Lady Elizabeth Bowes-Lyon married on 26



April. In a break with tradition, their wedding was a public affair at Westminster Abbey instead of at a royal chapel. It was not broadcast on the radio because the Archbishop of Canterbury was concerned that men might listen to it in public houses.



Jack Hobbs scored his 100th century on 8 th May

In rural Hunts, Tom Ashmore was born on the 30th.



In London, striking dockers marched for better pay and working conditions.

The employers had



proposed a reduction in wages from 8s to 5s 6d for the four-hour minimum employment period.



On 1st September a massive earthquake struck off the coast of Japan causing devastation in Tokyo and other cities as well as a tsunami.







In Germany inflation had made bank notes worthless and were used as fuel and playthings. A loaf of bread cost I billion marks in November.

That month in Britain Bill Cottom was born on the

3rd and posters appeared for the Earl Haig Fund. The first broadcast of Big Ben was on 31st December.




