

# Sworn to Secrecy

I joined the Dorset Regiment in Yorkshire where the I == Battallion was stationed after they had returned from the European Campaign where they had been knocked up a bit and we were to make them up to strength.

From there we went to Germany in November 1945 to relieve 4th Battalion at an airfield in the middle of a forest near the little village of Oerell.

There were what I called Junkers 88s, but now know were 86s, the three engined ones, lined up with their backs broken. Hidden from the air by the by the tops of the forest trees were dumps of mustard and other gas bombs

and between the trees were rows and rows of machine gun and canon ammunition. When we went into the village we had to carry our arms and were shouted at by the children. It was the only time I had been sworn at!. After settling down and sorting ourselves out, we were told we were going to Berlin.

There we used to do the guard mounting just outside the Barracks and there was always a big squad of Germans watching. On one occasion, as guard commander, I was detailed to take over from the 'Red Caps' at the HQ of General Sir Brian Robertson. When I got there, just a little late, which I presume was my fault, we settled in to the guard room. All of a sudden a Red Cap came in and asked for the guard commander. And when I said I was, he said "The general wants to see you." I wondered why he would want to see me but went in to where he was. He told me what was going on and that there

was to be a farewell party for General Montgomery given by the British Army in Germany and attended by he high-ranking officers of the Allied armies in Berlin. (The Russians were

not invited). When he asked what I would do, I said that I would put one man at the gate and one as a prowler round the perimeter. He said, "That's good. Nobody must know about this. Nobody. Now go and talk to the Provost Marshall." He agreed with how I would deploy my guard and said, "Tell them they are to shoot on sight at any one attempting to get into the grounds."

# The First Anzac Day

day at the ANZAC Hostel, Cairo, will be engraved for all time on the memories of those who were present. The auditorium of the Cairo Bourse (now the ANZAC Hostel) witnessed a scene that could not have been conjoured up by the wildest imagination of those who planned and built it. The narrow balcony which runs around the circular hall was crowded with soldiers who looked down upon a solemn congregation of officers, soldiers, nurses and many well known civilians who filled every inch of the ground

floor. . . . As the mournful chords of

Chopin's "Funeral March" died away

... It was evident that every heart felt the strain of sorrow, many on account of personal losses, and all felt a bond of sympathy and tragedy that united the children of the Motherland with those of the Colonies.'

'At the conclusion of the ceremony . . The scene outside was a most impressive one, as each hospital ambulance rolled up ready for ita unusual burden of beautiful flowers. On either side of the road . . . were lined up members of the Imperial Force, silently watching the floral tokens of respect being carried out of the door at a slow march, and strung on long poles, which were hung inside each ambulance car.

About twenty vehicles in all had been requisitioned,

and after the last one had been filled. the long procession started for the Cairo cemetery at a slow pace followed by the whole congregation. . . . At the cemetery, to the accompaniment of specially selected music, the men carried each wreath to its resting place on one of the five hundred Gallipoli heroes whose spirit and sacrifice laid the foundations of an everlasting reputation. . . . It is safe to say that in the whole of the British Empire there could not be a more wholehearted exhibition of sympathy than that which was manifested by the whole of the British community in Cairo.'

Let us give answer to their mute appeal to do nothing unworthy of the memory of each man, and in the

great struggle which yet calls for our utmost efforts to devote ouselves to the cause of our country and our liberties with the same lofty faith and courage that spurred them on."

From the Right Hon. James Allan, minister of Defence, Dominion of New Zealand.

"Anzac Day will be appropriately celebrated through New Zealand. Will you please convey to all attend-

> ing the memorial service at Anzac hostel and elsewhere in Egypt our faith in the soldiers the Allied Armies, our determination to support to the full the New Zealanders who had gone to the front, our sympathy with the relatives of those who are lost. and our hope that sick wounded may soon

be completely restored to health. Anzac Day will never be forgotten, but we look forward with full confidence to the dawn of another and brighter day which shall crown with success the work begun upon that day twelve months ago."

Cables from London reported other Anzac Day events there.

I had not seen Montgomery but my chaps said he had appeared on a balcony. He had left at about 3.30am. After I had returned to the Guard Room the Battalion Orderly Officer came in and asked what had been happening and told me off for not ringing back for extra men. After duty, a much longer shift than normal, back at the barracks. I heard "C O. Orders 9 o'clock, Jeacock." When the CO asked why they had not been told about the night's events, I said it was because the General had stressed that nobody was to be told. " Very Good. I'm pleased you did the right thing and you upheld the name of the regiment." And that was that. But there were other guard duties which I will tell you about at another time."
