# Obituary


Our oldest branch member, Charles (Charlie) Catling, died on 12th April a month before his 100th birthday. George Fleming carried the Standard at the funeral and four other of his branch colleagues attended he Service, coducted by our Chaplain, Rev. Richard Brant. In the address we heard that as a South Yorkshire lad he went down the pit at age 14 and joined the Navy before the War. Serving on Aircraft Carriers he was employed as a photographer. In 'civvy

street' he and his wife had settled in Market Harborough, where he became well known for the many weddings at which he was the photographer and as an active member of St Dionysius Church. He worked at Tungstone Batteries and was a retained Fireman. Charlie was a keen gardener and until a few years ago an active member of our branch.

We extend our condolences to all members of his family.

# HMS Ark Royal

A quite large collection of Chalie's Navy Photographs are now in the branch digital archive. Although they are not annotated several images indito the magnificent rescue by escort and other ships including HMS Legion, only one life was lost. Some of Chalie's pictures appear to show



cate his particular interest in the Ark Royal and we now know that he was a crew member in the successful operation to deliver Hurricane fighters to Malta. Returning to Gibralta the Carrier was hit by a torpedo. Thanks the last moments of the Ark Royal when she keeled over and sank at 0600 hours on 14th November 1941. Charlie had made sure his camera with him when he was transferred to one of the rescue vessels!

# VE Day 8th May 1945

The actual act of 'Unconditional Surrender' took place at General Eisenhower's Headquarters at Rheims in France, in what had been a school room. This was in the early hours of 7th May but it was not until there were simultaneous broadcasts by Churchill, Truman and Stalin announcing the surrender the following day that 8th May was officially the end of the War in Europe.

The surrender document (which can be accessed at

been prepared in
English, German,
Russian and French. It
was signed by General
Alfred Jodl on behalf of
Admiral Doenitz.

German Fuehrer since Hitler's death, Lieutenent General Beddel Smith representing Geneal Eisenhower for the Allied Forces, General Ivan Susloparov for Russia and General Francois Sevez for France.

After he had signed General Jodl said, 'I want to say a word. With this signature the German people and the German armed forces are for better or worse delivered into the victor's hands. In this war, which has

lasted more than five years, they both have achieved and suffered more than perhaps any other people in the world. In this hour I can only express the hope that the victor will treat them with generosity.

The BBC's Thomas Cadett, who watched the official signing, said it was carried out "on a cold and businesslike basis." There was no saluting and the Germans left the room. Those who remained in the 'war room' celebrated

with champagne drunk out of mess tins.

The Prime Minister, Winston Churchill, made his broadcast to the nation from 10 Downing Street, followed by a statement in the Commons. He then led a procession of MPs to St Margaret's Church for a service of thanksgiving.



Other church services were held at St Paul's with the boys' choir, just returned from Cornwall where they had been living during the war years. The restriction on Sunday morning bus services, introduced because of the war, was temporarily lifted to allow people to get to church the following weekend.

The war in Europe was over but the war against Japan continued for another four months.

# VE Day 50th Anniversary

Nationally, the Government said that

rather than celebrating the Allied victory over the German forces, the events should be dominated by civilian celebrations. In London these included a service in St. Paul's Cathedral attended by Helmut Kohl, the German Chancellor.

Here in Market Harborough, a Committee of relevant groups, lead by the RBL branch, had

prepared a programme of activities for the Bank Holiday weekend of 6st to 8st May. There was a VIP attended Anniversary Dinner at the Masonic Hall on the Saturday and a commemorative Service and Parade (led by the ATC Band) the following day. The Square was a hive of activity on the Monday, with stalls, entertainment and a collection of old military vehicles. A raffle in aid of the Poppy Appeal offered generously donated 'big

ertheless, John Sutton's statement to the mail ended, 'It went marvellously really, considering. We are generally pleased.'

As part of the celebrations Tom Jeacock had searched for and found two VE Day Babies, born on 8th May, one in 1945 and one in 1995. Each was presented with a set of commemorative coins.

# Memories of a Firefighter by John Black

n the late 60/70s the people of Birkenhead trusted their Firemen, except perhaps on Bonfire night. If you were on duty that night you could expect trouble. I was always on duty bonfire night.

This articular night we got a call to a bonfire, Dock Road, Birkenhead. We turned out, and found on a bomb site (yes they still had bomb sites) the mother of all bonfires, it was huge, made up of packing cases, wooden beams, furniture, tyres, etc, it was well alight, and all the smoke and sparks were flying over dock-land.

You might think that if we knew it was such a rough area, well we perhaps should have just checked it and gone on our way, but you see, between dock-land and the bonfire was a railway marshaling yard, and for some reason, unknown to us, in the middle of the yard was an ammunition train. So the Sub Officer in his wisdom, said put it out lads, that was when the bricks, bottles and other nasties came at us, the hoses were slashed and we were in trouble. The Police came along in a Morris Minor Panda car, that immediately got turned upside down. What happened to the Policemen I don't know, but we left as quickly as we could to lick our wounds.

That was bonfire night Birkenhead style. The next day everything was as right as rain.

#### From HQ

The Spring 2013 issue of Poppy Press commemorates the 70th anniversary of the Dambusters Raid on 16 th May 1943. Officially known as Operation Chastise, one of the most daring raids of WW II, it was carried out by 617 Squadron, RAF under the command of 24 years old Wng Cdr Guy Gibson, DFC. Only two of those who took part in the raid are still living, a New Zealand pilot, Flt Lt Les Munroe and a British bomb aimer, later, Sqd Ldr George 'Johnny' Johnson, now in his 90s. He relates, "We had six weeks low level training but didn't have the foggiest idea what it was about." It led to him bombing the Sorpe dam.

The Poppy Press article is a well illustrated account of the background to the operation with Dr Barnes Wallis's proposal to use, and the successful development of, the 'Bouncing Bomb'. The military and political success of the mission was achieved at the cost of the loss of 53 crewmen (and of very many more lives in the Ruhr Valley).

With each copy of this issue of Poppy Press was included a special message card for the recipient to return, with a donation to the Poppy Appeal, 'remembering the bravery of the 'Dambusters crews - and every man or woman who has served in our Armed Forces.' The cards will be displayed at the National Memorial Arboretum.
