Even the location of the factory suggested an air of quality, approached as it was down a pleasant country road on the outskirts of Coventry. A tour of the Jaguar Car Assembly Plant is a fascinating though tiring experience. A LETTER TO THE EDITOR

"Dear Sir, What can be done with a branch like this? It has 250 members. It has had no committee meeting since last October. No one attends the annual general meeting except the Legion committee which is re-elected every year en bloc on the proposition of one member who attends specifically for that purpose.

If there is a Legion rally, about 18 turn up; if a club outing plenty go. The only activity of the branch (apart from the benevolent committee) is Remembrance Day and Poppy Day -- plus a Christmas whist drive.

This branch is dead . . . killed by the club. -- Name and Address supplied."

Some members of our branch have bemoaned the fact that we do not have our own club, but the above letter may make them think again..-Ed 04/2001

Hospital Visits

made 98 years later Tom Ashmore explains

Dad would have been amazed that nearly a century after his spell in hospital in 1916 he helped virtual visitors from Anglesea, Australia and New Zealand, through the photos and souvenirs he kept.

The link is the website I have produced about Dad's VVVVI Army Service. The section 'Alexandria 1916' mentions 'a Naval engineer named Abbott', a newspaper, the Egyptian Gazette and Nazha Gardens.


Last August I received an email starting,

'Came across your very interesting web site this afternoon — and noticed the connection with H.M.S. Tara, a vessel I've been researching for a number of years. H.M.S. Tara was in fact the L & N.W.R. Co S.S. Hibernia, a steam packet or ferry sailing between Holyhead, Anglesey and Kingstown (now Dun Loaghaire, Ireland).

She was taken over by the Royal Navy in August 1914, renamed, armed, her crew (mostly of Holyhead) doubled and with a sprinkling of R.N. and R.N.R. personnel she was sent off to war. She was sunk off North Africa 5.11.15, the U boat responsible towing the survivors ashore in their lifeboats and where they were handed over to the Senussi (pro German Arabs) who took them into the interior and where they remained for 5 months until a

chance rescue by an armoured column on 17.3.16.

Tara carried a crew of 104 of which 18 died either during the sinking or in captivity, most survivors were suffering from dysentery, lack of food, medical care, etc. On returning to Alex the officers were sent to the Ras el Tin Hospital whilst the crew were sent to No 21 General Hospital and presumably where they met your father!



Not only am I researching the story of the Tara but have nearly fin is hed writing a book of the story. In the book I have

included a biography of each member of the crew and to date have photographs of 84 possibly 85 individuals and I would like to include a photograph of "Engineer Abbott" as is shown in your web site.

By the way Engineer Abbot was in fact Quartermaster Robert Abbitt of Holyhead, and had been suffering dreadfully from dysentery, etc since December 1915 and many a time they thought he would not pull through, but he did survive and died aged 73 in May 1926!



spelling for Nuzha as my nurse's hand
writing wasn't clear on the photo I had.

That name rang a bell so I wrote back saying that Dad took photos of the gardens (which are on the website)

Armed Forces Covenant

As briefly reported last month, Harborough District Council has formally committed to support the armed forces community. The photo of the signing ceremony was of the Council Chairman, Chief Executive and Leader with the Commanding Officer, Defence Animal Centre and RBL County Chairman.

The agreement is part of a national scheme launched by the Ministry of Defence to help improve links between the military and civilians. By signing the covenant the council agrees to:

Mark and remember past sacrifices. Encourage activities that integrate armed forces into community life.

Signpost any services for housing needs. Encourage armed forces to take up any benefits and discounts they are entitled to. Raise awareness of disability adaptations grants and advice available.

The Council has appointed an Armed Forces Champion, Cllr David Beaty, who will be a first point of contact for any serving or ex-service, or other charity/community groups with service connections who may need local authority input/approval.
