A POSTHUMOUS V.C.-ANZAC WINS THE CROSS.



Captain James Ernest Newlands (Australian Infantry), who on three separate occasions displayed the most con-spionous bravery and devotion to duty in the face of heavy

odds.

Lieutenant Robert Edwin Phillips (first picture), who went out under the most intense fire to the assistance of his com-manding officer, whom he eventually succeeded in bringing back to our lines. The rescued officer was Lieutenant-Colonel E. E. Delavel Henderson (second photograph), to whom the V.C. has also been awarded. Though wounded, Colonel Henderson cheered on his men under intense fire, receiving three more wounds, from which he eventually died.

Major Frederick William Lums-den, D.S.O., R.M.A., who brought six captured field guns into our lines, although the enemy kept the weapons under a continuous heavy fire.

Captain Albert Ball, D.S.O., M.C., Croix de Guerre, the young Nottingham airman, who was recently killed. In all he de-stroyed forty-three German aero-planes and one balloon. ۰.
