

The King writes to Harry White

John Timms has the letter

Harry White was my wife's maternal Grandfather and was taken Prisonerof-War at Arras. Following his repatriation he received this letter, found after he died and which prompted my contact with the Essex Regiment Museum (whose response is on page 5, Ed.)

29323. Sto Write . 4 2. Esseve 34 Con BUCKINGHAM PALACE 19/8. The Queen joins me in welcoming you on your release from the miseries & hardships, which you have endured with so much patience & courage. During these many months of trial, the early rescue of our gallant Officers & Man from the crueties of their captivity has been suppermost in our thoughts. We are thankful that this longed for day has arrived, & that hack in the old Country you will be able once more to enjoy the happiness of a home x to see good days among those who anxiously look for your return. Jearge R. J.

This was the "Kings Letter" he received on his repatriation after the armistice. - I believe it was sent to all returning P.O.VVs.

He later went on to be the Landlord of The Fox in Wilbarston and his grave is just inside the Churchyard in



that village. The headstone shows that he died in December 1953.

Dear Mr Timms, Thank you for your FAX of 01/02/2006.

I regret that we have little on your wife's grandfather other then to state that he is listed as being one of the men who received parcels from the Essex Regiment Prisoners of War Fund, and that his home town was Desborough. He also appears in the list of men who were posted as "Missing" in the Essex Chronicle, the newspaper for central Essex, in the edition of 31/05/1918. This suggests that he may have been taken prisoner in the period from 28/03/1918 onwards. At the latter date the 2nd Bn fought a costly action stemming the German advance at Arras. They

then fought an action when the Portuguese Division gave way in April which was also costly.

He was entitled to the British War and Allied Victory Medals, which is confirmed on the Medal Roll at the National Archives at Kew, File Reference WO329/1377. There is no note of these being returned on the roll and so it must be assumed that they reached him when sent out by the authorities in c1921.

There may well be more information in the local papers in his home area. Should you have an opportunity to look in this source, I would be grateful for a quick note, please, of the details that you might spot of any other local men who were posted in large numbers to the Essex Regiment. Often proud VVives and Mums wrote to local papers giving news of their men-folk at war.

You will appreciate, I am sure, that we have the potential to be asked about any man in the Regiment at any time and it is difficult for us to access sources outside the County of Essex.

Finally, could I ask his date of birth, please?

Portugal: a littleknown WW1 combatant

After war erupted in 1914, Portugal became increasingly anxious about its tenuous hold over its African colonies (Angola and Mozambique). In order to secure international support for its colonial claims, at first it supplied aid to the Allies until forced to enter the war when Germany declared war on Portugal on 9 March 1916. This was precipitated by the Portuguese government seizing German steam ships on the River Tagus in Lisbon, as well as German shipping in other ports including Lorenzo Marques, Cape Verde, the Azores and Madeira

Portugal's participation was initially limited to naval support, but in 1917 their first troops went to France. The Portuguese Expeditionary Force's part in the conflict was relatively minor as they only contributed 50,000 able-bodied soldiers at a late stage in the war. One battle they played a key role in was the Battle of Lys in Belgium in 1918. It was part of the German Spring Offensive, the last major German offensive of the First World War. The Portuguese divisions were struck hard by the Germans who took roughly 6,000 Portuguese soldiers prisoners.
