A Letter from Sunny Spain

Our roving reporter Tom Ashmore, passed on this letter he received from a lady he met on his Internet tour of Royal British Legion branches around the world.

What a nice surprise to receive your communication. My name is Zena Stockwell and I am the secretary of the Benalmadena Branch, and have been for 10 years now. We started 17 years ago and were the first branch in Spain, therefore we called ourselves the Costa del Sol Branch. Over the years other branches opened so we have had to change our name to the Benalmadena to avoid confusion. There are

now 12 branches in Spain South.

We are a small branch, 152 members, but in the past we were 400 plus, but it was inevitable that with more Branches opening members would

transfer nearer to home. Also in this area there are so many social clubs and clubs catering for every possible interest, line dancing, photography, choral, political, theatre, walking, bridge, animals, religious, so many I could go on and on. There is really no need for anyone who lives on their own to feel lonely here. We did publish a monthly newsletter years ago, but unfortunately the two men who used to write this died, and as with so many clubs and organisations, it is not easy to find someone to take their place, especially as we all seem to be in the older age group.

Our Branch has been fortunate in that we have been able to take a lease on our own premises, and we are the only branch in Spain to do so. Before that we had to rely on the goodwill of

bars to let us use their premises, and at times we did feel like nomads, continually moving on. We have a Branch meeting on the last Monday of the

day of the month, and a social get-together every Monday, except for July and August, when it's just too hot! So many members go back to the UK during this time, and those of us who stay are glad to not have commitments.

This month we had our branch meeting on the 24th as usual, followed by a bangers and mash lunch,

There were two public houses, the one by the canal bridge was kept by Mr. Monk, who, on his death left a considerable sum in trust for Foxton, the other kept by Mr. Goodridge was also the post office.

One memorable character in Foxton was a man named French, an old soldier. When in his cups, in which he could seldom indulge by reason of poverty, he used to describe how in the Indian Mutiny he could never be satisfied that he hit anybody when. firing his rifle and that in order to fulfil his ambition before leaving for England he found a dead black, set him up against the wall and fired at him. The boys of the village used to tease him, running after him shouting "Who shot the dead black". Another of his

boasts was that he was the only man in Foxton who had seen his own 'guts'. The occasion of this experience, of which he was so proud, was also in India where he had undergone an operation.

An extract from the Market Harborough Advertiser, which gives information of poor old Edward French, reads

"One used to read how in bysone days England used to treat its old soldiers, and the following is perfectly true, when the Crimean War broke out in 1854 there was a rush to enlist. A Foxton young man, Edward French, enlisted, but he was sent to India instead of Russia, and was in all the later fighting and battles that followed the terrible massacre of Cawnoore and the Indian Mutiny. French was with Sir Henry Havelock at the relief of Lucknow and served with the English Army till the Mutiny was successfully put down. He continued in India till 1863, when he was sent home owing to III health. He was discharged from the Army and was paid the sum of £10 in full and final settlement of any claims against the English War Office. French later got married, but constant ill health led him to be often out of work. At this time Mr. John Watson set him to work on his farms and he lived in a cottage of Mr. Watson's at a rent of I/- per week. This was a good house with a large garden. But French's illness still attacked him at different times in the year end it is said that it was a tropical disease brought back from India and he and his family were very badly off even at times for food.

He had a little parish relief and the village people were very kind to him. His wife sold his Mutiny medal for 2/6 to a Harborough jeweller to buy food. This is perfectly true and after constant attacks of illness poor French died in 1879. It was said in the village that Mrs. Spriggs and Miss Florrie Watson paid for the coffin furniture, as it was a parish funeral and these were not usually allowed

Foxton has in its long history produced many worthy men, but none more than this gallant soldier finished up with a pauper's grave. Some remarkable incidents followed, in which Mr John Watson made his influence felt. At that time cash payments were not legal, only on a very low scale. An adult could not have more than 3/6 per week out of relief with the alternative of Harborough Workhouse

The Guardians wanted Mrs. French to go with her three young boys into the Harborough Workhouse. Mrs.

Haddon, of Lubenham Lodge, took

the oldest girl aged 13 to live with her and train her for service. Mr. Watson strongly protested against the Guardians not giving Mrs. French the relief and threatened to get Mr. I Paget, at that time M. P. for the



Harborough Division, to bring the matter up in the House of Commons. The Guardians then gave way and they allowed Mrs. French 3/6 each for her three Workhouse | boys, and paid the

school fees (6d.) and I/- for the weekly rent, though it is said Mr. Watson never took the rent but always returned it and had done so for a number of years.

Legion Policy on Northern Ireland Legacy Investigations.

Welland Park Memorial A Ceremony to Unveil and Bless the newly installed memorial was held on 25th May, 1996



After Our Standard Bearers. George Fleming and John Cox and those of invited RBL branches had assembled, Deputy Lieutenant, Robin Murray-Philipson, unveiled the memorial which was then Blessed by Rev. Grenville-Gibbins. Rev. C. Moody gave an address and led prayers before Branch secretary, Andrew Marriott laid a wreath and the Last Post was sounded. The service ended with the Act of Homage and a two minutes silence.
