## PETER WOOD 1917 - 22 March 2015

About 16 branch members attended his funeral, including national chairman John Crisford, branch chairman Terry Austin, branch standard bearer Steve Greef and branch chaplain Peter Cook. Two standards were paraded, the second being from the Monte Cassino Society.

Peter always described himself as a "D-Day Dodger", and a recording of the song "We are the D-Day Dodgers" to the tune of 'Lili Marlene', got the proceedings off to a good start. The term was claimed to have been used in parliament by Viscountess Astor, although there is no official record and she denied using it, to describe those servicemen serving in Italy while others were storming the Normandy beaches.
