The Conference will be held in London from 13-15 May. Online and in person attendees will be able to debate and vote on motions, ask their questions during the Membership Forum and watch the National Chairman, the Director General and other senior representatives share updates about the RBL's strategy. In person attendees will also be able to attend the Standard Bearers competition and visit the exhibition area to meet teams from across the RBL.

The Parade will take place on Sunday 15 May. All participants are asked to register in advance as delegates or visitors. The Parade will start from King Charles Street and will end in Horse Guards Parade with wreaths laid at the Cenotaph, the Earl Haig Memorial and the Women of the Second World War Memorial.

Festival of Remembrance 2022

In 2022, we will approach the Festival of Remembrance through the core values of "service" which make our Armed Forces such an inspiration to all.



Through words, song, and storytelling, the Festival will reveal the qualities behind service which make it an essential part of life in the Armed Forces – and civil society:

- · Placing others before oneself;
- Being utterly reliable and trustworthy;
- Dedication to a higher purpose and commitment to seeing things through;
- and so forth.

The nation hopefully is emerging from a long period of great difficulty when these qualities – or their absence – were viewed in high relief. The 2022 Festival will reinforce our admiration of the unfailing sense of service displayed by the Armed Forces and commemorate those who gave their service even at the cost of their lives.

We intend for there to be four key elements and one optional element drawing upon this theme:

- 1. Dedication to service has nowhere been shown more faithfully than in the lifetime of **Her Majesty the Queen**.
- 2. We will pay tribute to the unshakable service of all elements of HM Armed Forces during the 1982 **Falklands War**.
- 3. We will recognise and pay tribute to the service of **LGBT** personnel and veterans.
- 4. We will mark important anniversaries of three proud units, the **Royal Marine Commando**, the **RAF Regiment**, and the **Brigade of Gurkhas**.
- 5. We also have the option of marking the anniversaries of the only George Cross medals awarded collectively, to the people and island of **Malta**, the **Royal Ulster Constabulary**, and the **NHS**.

This year also marks the 80th anniversary of significant events of 1942 in World War Two; such as the disaster of Dieppe, victory at El Alamein, and the fall of Singapore.

However, the RBL has decided that its Remembrance position will not include Second World War elements on their individual anniversaries but instead will come back to the war's commemoration every five years. The next such anniversary will be WWII 80 in 2025.

This approach prevents the Festival, and Remembrance generally, from repeating the same five-year cycle of anniversaries for the next 25 years. Instead, it will allow us time to evolve the Second World War's commemoration in ways which honour its remaining veterans while keeping its storytelling alive and resonant with fresh generations.

Falklands 40

On the 2 April 1982, Argentine forces invaded the British overseas territory of the Falkland Islands, sparking one of the largest major conflicts since WW2.

Lasting 74 days, the conflict was the first military action since the Second World War that utilised all elements of the Armed Forces.
